Trainer's Reports

n Wednesday, 25th August a visit was made for the purpose of completing the Partnership Evaluation for Guy and Sara. This visit completed the hand-over phase of Sara to Guy. The next planned visit will be in 6 months time to reevaluate the partnership.

Guy and his family have stated that they are very happy with Sara, who has now become a much loved member of the family. The relationship between Guy and Sara appears to be working very well and there have been no problems. Sara appears to be in good condition both physically and emotionally and her performance

of tasks is excellent. Sara's walks consist only of a short walk down the drive to the main gate. However, combined with regular play sessions several times a week with Guy's neighbour's dog, Tyro, this seems to be sufficient to maintain Sara's weight within a healthy range.

Formal trainer instruction with Ann Barnacoat commenced this month. Ann shows great enthusiasm and commitment to her new role as dog trainer and has made good progress with Barnaby's training. His performance of tasks and behaviour during public access activities are both excellent. Barnaby appears to possess both the cognitive ability and the temperament necessary for success as an assistance dog.

Parnaby is keen to work for food and treats. He fetches and carries when asked, taking things from a to b and puts things in a specific place when told. He is making good progress with push, tug, and now 'lift' as in lifting the toilet seat, and lifting the footplates on the wheelchair. He is starting to tug off my jacket and shoes.

Public access training is all good so far. Doctor's and Dentist's surgeries posed no problems. Shopping centres, escalators, travelators have also been done regularly and Barnaby takes it all in his stride. School playground twice a week is also enjoyed.

The vet recently commented on Barnaby's temperament by saying she wished they were all like him! Her comment on his weight for size was "perfect".

Barnaby displays good dog park behaviour, and I have been told he's welcome at the Guide Dog socialisation days anytime. He goes to those one a month. Last time 15 dogs were there and he was very well behaved.

We ran the baby contest in the early days, as well, to obtain greater exposure in support of our badge selling.

Locations were as varied as Erina Shopping Town, where we enlisted the help of Erina High school students to help us sell badges, shopping centres at Blacktown, Penrith, Bonnyrigg, Forestville, St Ives Village, Merrylands, Campbelltown, Marrickville, Brookvale, Warriewood, as well as Circular Quay ferry wharf, Manly Wharf, Darling Harbour, and many other locations that escape me at the moment.

It was a real tear jerker when Bonny, our first trained assistance dog, was placed with Del Baker, who came down from Tamworth for final training with Bonny. 

We recently received an email update on Jedda, who you may remember went to Corrective Services NSW to be trained as a mobile phone sniffer dog. We are thrilled with Jedda's prowess at this job! This is the email from Angela West at the Department of Corrective Services, 13th August 2010:

Jedda recently had to do a display for the Minister of Corrective Services and I told him about how Jedda came to be in our care, and he was absolutely amazed at her abilities.

There is a media release from Minister Costa on the Corrective Services NSW website about the mobile program which mentions a number of finds that Jedda made. Jedda was also on Channel Nine news on 12th August.

Jedda as you know is one of two K9s only in the country detecting mobile phones in Australian Prisons. Of the 20 mobile phones detected inside NSW correctional centres this past 8 months, 12 were found by Jedda.



She also went to Victoria and competed in the Service Dog Trials which have Police, Customs, Army, Corrections and Fire Services from all states competing in various detection categories. She came 3rd in the non narcotic detection category - this was amazing and she is just a pleasure to be around. Angela West, Department of Corrective Services
