Now partnered with Barbara, Weemala's Manager, they attend their workplace together each weekday and return home for the evenings and weekends. The transition period was long and structured to ensure that Freya, Barbara, Weemala's residents and staff were all very familiar and comfortable with each other and their new routines.

Barbara and Freya have quickly developed a close bond and are working beautifully together.

On Freya's progress so far, Barbara is pleased to report, "Freya's purpose in life is to be loved and to love. She is fulfilling her purpose! 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PUPPY PROGRESS & TRAINING UPDATES

A NEW PUPPY FOR ASDOG

Our new puppy raiser is excitedly awaiting the arrival of one of the gorgeous Labrador Retriever puppies pictured right. Gayl, ASDOG's Training Coordinator, is looking forward to working with the new recruits.

ASDOG will guide the litter of puppies through a series of selection tests prior to purchase to maximize our chances of selecting a suitable assistance dog. So what characteristics does ASDOG look for in all of its new puppies? Assistance Dogs International recommends the following guideline: A good service dog is not protective, is people orientated, is not overly active, and is confident but not dominant or submissive.







OUT AND ABOUT WITH KARA

Kara, above, is now nine months old and making great gains in her puppy raising program. She has been very busy working on 'fetch', 'nose', 'paw' and 'side'. She is becoming familiar with a range of public areas including shopping centres, grocery shops, buses and parks.

Puppy raiser, Andrea, is very happy with Kara's progress, particularly when practising public access work. "I am lucky to have guardianship of this calm, loving and wonderfully polite dog. It is a pleasure to take her out."

Gayl, Ivy's advanced skills trainer for the next twelve months, sums up her pleasing progress so far:

In January Ivy moved into my house for her formal advanced training period. She settled in very well. Ivy and Lenny, my greyhound, are already the best of mates. They love running together on the old golf course, though try as she may she can't catch him. She is an absolute joy!


Ivy is learning and enjoying each training session. We've been working on retrieving, holding and placing items in tins and boxes. Ivy is also finding and retrieving keys and mobile phones, and taking socks off.

Ivy and I gave a talk at Selwood House Vet Clinic on dog training and assistance dogs. She attended a wine and cheese event first and was very good - though she did get a little excited when a dog came out of the hospital! During the talk, she demonstrated some of the tasks. Everyone loved her!

She has been going to Canine College with me. She attended last year with her puppy raiser, Andrea, so she is quite comfortable and good at it.

We've done plenty of public access training in a number of large shopping centres, local shops, cafés and veterinary clinics.

Overall, Ivy has a very even temperament. She loves my family and life in the mountains. Her training is going very well: she's a delight!
